The team were then given a tour around a Children's Ward and the chance to chat to some of the nurses and other members of staff about their experiences and what their job roles entail.

Given the chance at the end to personally reflect, both Charlotte and her fellow St Cuthbert's student made highly insightful comments about the level of team work they had seen in the hospital and how everyone works together to ensure that we have somewhere to go, and someone to treat us free of charge, if we become ill.

Overall it was a fantastic experience and Charlotte gained insights into both the work of the NHS and also how television programmes are planned, researched and put together - it's a very complicated process!

VISITORS TO SACRED HEART

This year we have been lucky enough to welcome two visitors to school who have helped us to reflect on this year's Sacred Heart Goal - Social Awareness.

Sr. Cecile Meijer rscj is one of the Society of the Sacred Heart's representatives at the UN. The Society has been present at the United Nations as a non-governmental organisation (NGO) since early 2003. Their aim is twofold: to share information with the order and the wider Sacred Heart family about critical world issues, and to give the sisters the opportunity to contribute their experience, reflection and analysis to the international policy debate.

Sr. Cecile was in England to deliver a prestigious lecture at Roehampton University but she took time to visit all the Sacred Heart schools in England. Her visit to Fenham was extremely popular - especially with A Level Geographers and members of the Justice and Peace Group.

Sr. Cecile's talk covered issues as diverse as human rights, the MDGs (Millennium Development Goals), the environment and our planet, peace, poverty and people on the move (migrants, refugees, IDPs).

The students welcomed the opportunity to pose questions to someone whose work takes them so close to the centre of political power and influence. However, it was also abundantly clear that they were talking to someone who was a member of the same worldwide family. It was a tangible reminder of the shared ethos of a Sacred Heart education and the need to put our Goal of Social Awareness into action.

Our second visitor was Eva Clarke who was born in Mauthausen Concentration Camp, Austria, on 29th April 1945. She and her mother are the only survivors of their family, 15 members of whom were killed in Auschwitz: 3 of Eva's grandparents, her father, uncles, aunts and her 7 year old cousin, Peter.

Eva visits schools on behalf of the Holocaust Educational Trust. She tells the story of her family's persecution in Nazi controlled Europe, her birth at Mauthausen and the way in which she and her mother survived the chaos of post war Europe.

Her story was received in complete silence by members of Year 9 and the Sixth Form and was followed by a range of thought provoking questions. Hearing about these issues at first hand reinforced the work being carried out in history lessons and again reminded the students of the need to be aware of world events.

Following the talk, Eva met a small group of Sixth Formers including the Head Girls and the students who had visited Auschwitz as part of the Lessons From Auschwitz Project. Students also took part in workshops organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust.





The Royal Shakespeare Company perform at Sacred Heart

On Thursday 2nd July, the Royal Shakespeare Company took up residence in our school hall to perform 'The Famous Victories of Henry V'. A matinee performance was given to our Year 7 students, followed by an evening performance at 7pm for parents, staff, and children from our local primary schools.

The production is a condensed version of three Shakespeare history plays, Henry IV Parts I and II and Henry V. Directed by Owen Horsley and aimed at children aged eight to 13, it coincides with the 600th anniversary of the Battle of Agincourt which figures in Henry V.

After giving two performances at Newcastle Theatre Royal, the RSC gave two more at St Michael's primary school before moving to Sacred Heart. The North East tour is part of the RSC's Learning and Performance Network, a three-year touring and education partnership with 10 regional theatres, including the Theatre Royal, and schools in each area.

The show started with all cast members explaining the plot, and engaging everyone in some audience participation to add to the atmosphere of the performance.

In the touring production seven actors play a range of parts with Martin Bassendale as Henry V and Simon Yadoo as Falstaff.

This performance has been part of a longer term project between our school and the Royal Shakespeare Company, and we are very excited about welcoming them back next year to work with our girls on "A Midsummer Night's Dream".





Final Justice & Peace update of the year!

As the year winds to a close, so does the fantastic work of Justice and Peace for the time being! The girls have done a fantastic job all year and have helped raise awareness of a variety of causes both locally and internationally.

Here is a brief summary of some of our group's finer moments:

- Organising the 'Can for Christmas' appeal in December. As a school we all clubbed together and donated a can of food each. These were then distributed to the West End Foodbank and the Diocesan Refugee Project
- Raising awareness of the '5p bus' - this is a project run by St Cuthbert's Care and throughout the school girls donated clothes and a variety of other items to be sold on the bus, in some of Newcastle's most deprived areas, for only 5p
- Continuing to run a highly successful Traidcraft stall, the funds from which go to support communities and producers in developing countries
- Maintain high attendance at our monthly 'Bread and Cheese Lunches', where we also fundraise to support the young girl we sponsor in Rwanda
- Continuing to broaden our horizons and raise our own, and others, awareness of issues that need our attention both here in Newcastle and around the globe. We have heard from speakers from The Samaritans, Freedom from Torture, CAFOD and many more.

I am sure you will agree it has been a fantastic year for the group and we are all really looking forward to continuing our good work from September, when I am sure we will be welcoming plenty of new members!

Year 12 Visits to Galleries and Degree Shows



Over 180 students took part in the Music Department Easter Concert at Northern Stage in March.



Academic heritage and success in the heart of Newcastle

SACRED HEART HIGH SCHOOL FOR GIRLS HAS BEEN DEVOTED TO THE EDUCATION OF WOMEN SINCE 1905. HERE, HEADMISTRESS MRS BATH TELLS US MORE ABOUT THE SCHOOL'S VALUES AND ITS SUCCESSFUL APPROACH.

Sacred Heart High School is part of a worldwide network of schools founded in the 1800s by St Madeleine Sophie Barat, eight of which are in the UK. The network stretches from Hammersmith to Rome and New York City to Mexico City.

Our family of Sacred Heart schools was established after the French Revolution with the foremost intention of educating girls – the women of the future – who would make society a better place for everyone.

This burning ambition of our founder is still what drives our school in Fenham today, as we strive to provide a world-class education for the girls in our care – something we are very successful at achieving.

A LONG TRACK RECORD OF SUCCESS

Sacred Heart has been an Ofsted Outstanding school since 2007 and is one of a handful of schools in our region to remain Outstanding under the new inspection framework.

Our results consistently place us in the top 100 of state funded schools nationally. Indeed, in the recent Times league tables, Sacred Heart was the top performing state school, achieving better results than some independent schools.

This year's GCSE results have been the best ever with 82 per cent of our students achieving five or more A*-C grades including English and Maths at first entry, and this in a year of examination turmoil where results fell dramatically. Almost one in five girls also gained eight or more A*/A grades which is a fantastic achievement. Nationally, only one in five grades are A*/A, but at Sacred Heart this is now more than one in three, at 35 per cent.

UNIVERSITY SUCCESS

Again our results at A level are superb. Students achieve both the highest grades and highest proportion of AAB grades at A level within state schools in the city. Last year 25 per cent of grades were A*/A, one in five students achieved two or more A*/A and better than one in three achieved two or more A*-B. This ensures that our students leave us for Russell Group Universities to follow high tariff courses such as medicine, architecture, computing, dentistry and economics.

This year, three of our students have secured places at Oxbridge, whilst others are heading for local destinations such as Durham and Newcastle with whom we have forged close links. Other popular university choices include LAMDA, LSE, Imperial and UCL.

Our newly extended and refurbished Sixth Form centre offers superb facilities for study, which rival university campus facilities and enable our students to flourish as they prepare for their examinations and the adult world beyond.

Whilst our school is single sex in years 7-11, in the Sixth Form we welcome boys from our partner school St Cuthbert's, and so both genders are able to work together and share in common events that will prepare them for either higher education or the

world of work. We believe this approach works particularly well and our results are testament to this.

THE WHOLE CHILD

The education of the 'whole child' is integral to our Sacred Heart philosophy. As we live in society with others, relationships are a vital part of this education. Much time and emphasis is placed on fostering good relationships, and showing consideration and respect for others.

We also provide a vast array of extra-curricular activities for our girls to experience. Indeed, many of our students participate in sport at regional and national level. As well as a packed programme of after school clubs, we run Duke of Edinburgh to gold standard, with expeditions taking place throughout the year. We want our school to provide life long memories for our students and as a result, we run annual trips to destinations such as Barcelona, Bergamo Italy, and the French Alps, with charitable expeditions to Morocco and Uganda.

Sacred Heart prides itself in its commitment to the performing arts, which means students can access fabulous facilities for music, dance and drama. Each year our students participate in a wonderful music evening at Northern Stage and this year the Royal Shakespeare Company will stage Henry Vth on our school stage using some of our students as actors.

FAQs

Do you have to be a Catholic to join Sacred Heart?

No. Whilst many of our students come from Catholic families, a large proportion are not and are from families who want their daughters to be educated in a faith setting. Each year about 25 places are reserved for girls who have a talent for the performing arts and want to attend a school that will enable them to develop their talents further. All of this is clearly set out in our admissions criteria, available on the Sacred Heart website.

Can I visit Sacred Heart during the school day?

Yes. As well as official open evenings for prospective Year 7 parents and Sixth form, we run visits throughout the year, where parents are welcome to see the school in operation and ask questions to the senior leader who will conduct the tour.

Year 8 Travel to Westminster to Celebrate Eight Hundred Years since Magna Carta

Twenty seven pupils from Year 8 travelled to London to take part in activities hosted by the Houses of Parliament's Parliamentary Archives to celebrate the De Montfort Project, an outreach project inspired by the eight hundred years since the Magna Carta was sealed and seven hundred and fifty years since the meeting of the De Montfort Parliament in 1265. Both historical events helped to eventually pave the way for our modern, democratic Houses of Parliament.

The pupils, selected for their achievements in History lessons, have been working in conjunction with the Tyne and Wear Archives at the Discovery Museum to learn about the life and impact of four local 'radical' politicians, Joseph Cowen, Lord Lawson of Beamish, Earl Grey and Ellen Wilkinson. After taking part in a workshop at the Discovery Museum pupils travelled to Westminster to visit the Parliamentary Archives and take part in further research activities.

Other highlights included a tour of the Victoria Tower, seeing some of England's oldest Acts of Parliament, one dating back as far as 1497 and England's longest Act of Parliament from 1821 which is nearly a quarter of a mile long and takes two men a day to rewind. Year 8 also saw Acts signed by Henry VIII and Elizabeth I and a banner exhibition charting major laws that have made a difference in Westminster Hall.

Following their trip to London Year 8 will undertake further work for the Project, including making a banner to celebrate the lives of the four politicians they have studied and attending an evening celebration at the Discovery Museum.

On 22nd June twenty-four sixth form students attended the diocesan Sixth Form Festival at the Youth Village, near Consett.

After learning the names of those in our group in a highly entertaining manner (including hopping around on one leg, throwing a ball around and a member of our group doing a very energetic dance) we settled down to ask ourselves some questions about what forgiveness means.

We really challenged ourselves, and each other, to think about things we had heard from Father Jim and by the end of our group session we had come up with a further question we wanted him to answer - which he did before the end of the day. 
The 18 girls who completed the course gained great insight into the importance of teamwork, encouraging others and working together as one unit, each of them a cog in a well oiled machine.

At the Presentation Evening, I received a certificate. Individual photos were taken of the individual prize winners and a group photo for the certificate winners. Lastly, there was a mathematical talk from a few different members of the University Maths Department. To conclude, I was quite surprised that I was selected in the top 50 out of the 1000 entries and am hoping to take part next year as well."

DNA Fingerprints

The Spring term ended in a blast for Year 13 A-Level Biology students who attended the Centre for Life for one day in order to make their own DNA fingerprint.

They were able to determine whether or not they carry a specific gene (for tasting a chemical in sprouts). As seen on crime shows on TV the students amplified their small amount of DNA in a process known as PCR, they then added gene markers (fluorescence) and then ran their DNA sample using Gel Electrophroesis.

This makes a pattern similar to a bar code which is different for everyone, with the exception of identical twins. The session concluded with a discussion on why the distribution of this particular gene varies in different countries, and the possible advantage of having the gene.



Year 9 Hit the Lake District

On the 11th and 12th of May, 20 students from year 9 were selected to take part in a residential trip to The Lake District due to their achievements and effort in Geography and/or PE.

The group left Sacred Heart on Monday morning and arrived at Newlands Activity centre ready for the afternoon activity of High Ropes. Sacred Heart Catholic High School Steps into First Place



Students at Sacred Heart Catholic High School in Newcastle have walked away with the top prize in a Tyne and Wear walking challenge.

The Year 7 and Year 8 students beat stiff competition from three other schools in Tyne and Wear to be named Tyne and Wear Spring 2015 Walking Challenge Winner, as part of the Schools Go Smarter Programme.

The challenge formed part of a 'transitions' project, developed to help students moving from first to secondary school make informed choices around sustainable travel.

The challenge was delivered on behalf of Schools Go Smarter (gosmarter.co.uk) by Living Streets (livingstreets.org.uk), and saw teams of students at Boldon School (South Tyneside), St Cuthbert's Catholic High School (Newcastle), St Anthony's Girls' Catholic Academy (Sunderland) and Sacred Heart Catholic High School (Newcastle) log the number of steps and miles walked over a four week period.

More than 200 Year 7 and Year 8 students at Sacred Heart Catholic High School took part in the challenge logging a total of 4,152 miles, which put them at first place. As well as claiming the title of Tyne and Wear Spring 2015 Walking Challenge Winner, the students also won a £300 cash prize for their school.

Alison Fisher, Transitions Project Coordinator at Living Streets, said:

"From the very start of the challenge it was clear the students at Sacred Heart Catholic High School were really engaged in the project.

"They produced posters to promote the challenge in school and they also helped plan and deliver school assemblies to encourage more students to take part.

"The Sacred Walking Team also held lunch time sign up sessions to show fellow students how to sign up to the challenge online and how to record their steps with the help of a pedometer or free smartphone app."

The Tyne and Wear Spring 2015 Walking Challenge aimed to address the 25% drop in student walking rates from primary to secondary schools. It was also designed to encourage more students at secondary schools to walk regularly.
